Further back then that, I remember an incident when I was in my teens working at a restaurant in the South when a guy pulls up in a pick up truck with about 25 dehydrated chickens tied at the ankle in groups of 5 or so. They were barely alive and I happened to walk by and saw them and just jumped up there and poured water on them reviving them, and then I untied them all. They ran all over the place. Yes I laugh at this and luckily so did the guy who was driving the truck. The other half of my life consists of raising and training quarter horses, and I have 3 dogs that accompany me wherever I go except for court. We live in the country on a 40 acre farm and my physical office is in Clackamas.

Stephanie Engelsman: I was on the board of the Animal Law Review and was a member of SALDF. My first job out of law school was as a Staff Attorney for the Animal Legal Defense Fund. I now work at the Metropolitan Public Defender.
